The positive outcome is aimed to encourage future micro loans from the Bank of the Marshall Islands.



Sea Dragon's debris search

The 72-foot research vessel Sea Dragon is on its way to the Marshall Islands from Honolulu, according to the Hawaii News Now website.

The vessel will be conducting a study of the debris field generated by the tsunami in Japan a year ago March.

"We know that an estimated 20 million tons of rubbish left Japan on that certain day," Sea Dragon program director Emily Penn told Hawaii News Now. The vessel will carry scientists, film crews and environmentalists through

> the heart of the debris field. An estimated one to two million tons remain on the surface from the wall of waste sucked into the ocean.

> The vessel left Honolulu earlier this week for the RMI. The debris field trip will be in two parts, a 23-day sail from the Marshall Islands to Tokyo, then a longer more intense leg from Tokyo to Maui.
